## RECAP: WHAT ARE THE SSF GUIDELINES?

## First ever **negotiated international instrument** entirely dedicated to SSF

- → A global consensus on principles and guidance for small-scale fisheries governance and development
- → Developed through a consultative process

## Bring together social development and responsible fisheries

→ beyond fisheries

#### Complement other international instruments

→ Code of Conduct for Responsible Fisheries; Right to Food Guidelines; Voluntary Guidelines on the Responsible Governance of Tenure of Land, Fisheries and Forests - common grounding in **human rights principles**

#### **HOW WERE THE SSF GUIDELINES DEVELOPED?**

2008: First Global Conference on Small-Scale Fisheries, Bangkok + CSO statement

**2013:** Technical Consultation

**2014:** Resumed Session of the Technical Consultation

2009: 28<sup>th</sup> COFI expressed need for an international instrument on SSF 2011 – 2013: National, regional, international consultations, workshops, events

**2014:** 31<sup>st</sup> COFI – Endorsement of the SSF Guidelines

2010: Regional consultations on bringing together responsible fisheries and social development

2011: 29<sup>th</sup> COFI recommends development of international instrument directly involved

### **WORKSHOP MODALITIES AND KEY OUTCOMES**

- About 3 days workshops with representatives of governments, regional organisations/Regional Fishery Bodies (RFBs), CSOs/non-state actors, NGOs, research institutions, academia, and others
- Purpose: to develop elements for RPOAs and NPOAs

#### **SOME OUTCOMES RELATED TO PARTICIPATION:**

- Strengthening of SSF organizations
- More people-focused fisheries management
- Empowerment of and affirmative action for women





## REGIONAL INITIATIVES AND ACTIONS

- The Caribbean: CRFM SSF protocol to Caribbean Community Common Fisheries Policy (CCCFP)
- Central America: OSPESCA SSF working group (FAO, Costa Rica, OSPESCA, regional SSF organizations are members)
- Southeast Asia: SEAFDEC Regional approach to SSF Guidelines Council supported the policy brief "Applying Human Rights-Based and Gender Equality Approaches to Small-Scale Fisheries in Southeast Asia"
- Latin America: development of an implementation guide and the establishment of a Mesoamerican Indigenous Peoples Network
- The Mediterranean and the Black Sea: SSF RPOA and GFCM high level SSF meeting

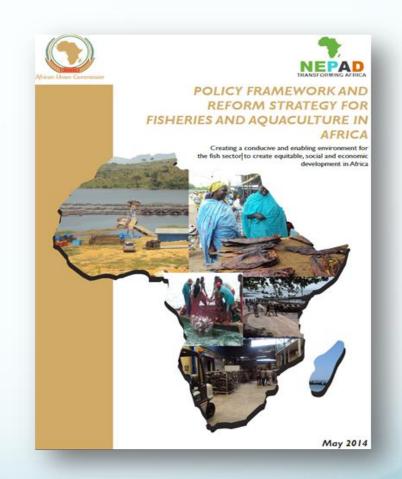


## **AU-IBAR NON-STATE ACTOR PLATFORMS**

One of the principles of the POLICY FRAMEWORK AND REFORM STRATEGY FOR FISHERIES AND AQUACULTURE IN AFRICA:

to improve and strengthen the contribution of **small-scale fisheries** to poverty alleviation, food and nutrition security and socio-economic benefits of fishing communities.

FISH GOV I 2.3: Strengthen stakeholder organization, participation and promotion of the participatory fisheries management especially of the community-based management (co-management) of **small-scale fisheries**.





## **CHALLENGES**

- Proliferation of NSAs working at the interface between the Government and in fishing communities,
- Non-recognition or non-formalization of their roles and extent of their contribution to sector development.
- Low support for enhanced capacity and empowerment.
- Inadequate institutional capacity and poor coordination.
- Weak linkages and synergies between the various NSAs at national and regional levels.
- Weak working relationships with the State actors.

## **PROCESS**

- Questionnaire to build inventory
- Support to establishment of 5 regional platforms in collaboration with RECs
- Collaboration RECs
- One (or two) organisation member from each country
- Autonomous
- Intention to build continental platform





### **WEST AFRICA AND SOUTHERN AFRICA**

Platforms with somewhat different structures, members and purpose

#### **WANSAFA**

- Focus on SSF
- Small-scale aquaculture and NGOs
- ECOWAS:
  - ➤ Process of regional policy dialogue involvement / participation of all stakeholders of the sector in West Africa including the Non-State Actors.

#### **SANSAFA**

- Both SSF and LSF
- Aquaculture and NGOs
- SADC:
  - ➤ To facilitate broad based & equitable participatory processes in the region to involve small-scale fishers in the control & management of their fishing & related activities.

- ALLOW FOR DIFFERENCES OF VIEWS
- BUILD MEMBERSHIP
