## Core documents - published 13 July 2011

- Commission <u>Communication</u> on External Dimension of the Common Fisheries Policy – COM(2011) 424 – covering:
  - Informal bilateral relations ("Northern" countries US, Japan, Russia, ...)
  - Regional fisheries management organisations
  - Bilateral fisheries agreements (developing countries)
  - Multilateral organisations (UN, OECD, ...)
  - Policy coherence
- Commission proposal for new "Basic Regulation" COM(2011) 425
  - To repeal Council Regulation (EC) No 2371/2002
  - New part (Art. 39–42) on external policy
  - Impact assessment (SEC(2011) 891) includes separate study on external dimension (Annex 11)



### More effective RFMOs

- Efficient decision-making in RFMOs based on solid science (→ Art. 39 draft Basic Reg.)
- Increased compliance through sanctions/incentives and control measures (→ Art. 40)
- Capacity management
- Consider fees for placing vessels on authorised-vessels lists of some RFMOs



# FPAs – status quo

### Current fisheries partnership agreements

- 15 FPAs in force (Eastern Atlantic, Indian Ocean, Pacific, Greenland)
- Access to third countries' EEZs <-> financial compensation from EU budget
   + ship-owners' contribution
- Partnership element: support to third-country fisheries policy
- Yearly EU budget: ~ 160 M€

### Shortcomings

- Gaps in scientific knowledge (state of stocks)
- Lack of info on total fishing effort (local + EU + other DWF)
- Limits to sector-specific absorption capacity of third countries

# New generation of agreements (SFAs)

- Reinforced governance (→ Art. 41(1))
  - Introducing human rights clause
  - Closing loopholes in exclusivity clause (reflagging)
  - Increasing ship-owners' share of payments
- Better knowledge base targeting surplus only (→ Art. 41(2))
  - Scientific audits on mixed agreements
  - Complete, reliable catch data
  - Transparency clause (→ total effort)
  - Maintaining/restoring MSY
- More effective sectoral support (→ Art. 42)
  - Sectoral support decoupled from payments for access right
  - Based on third countries' sector-specific needs, absorption capacity
  - Stronger conditionality
